Introduction

In a multi-ethnic and multi-religious society like Malaysia, maintaining social harmony and unity presents a significant challenge. The historical context of racial tensions, most notably the devastating 1969 racial riot, continues to underscore the critical importance of mutual respect, understanding, and tolerance among different cultural and religious groups. Despite achieving 67 years of independence, the nation still grapples with underlying racial and religious sentiments that threaten social cohesion.

Previous research has highlighted the potential for religious tolerance among Malaysian youth, yet emphasizes the need for increased inter-racial interaction and socialization. The path to national unity has been pursued through various mechanisms, including language policy, educational strategies, and efforts to change the medium of instruction. However, a persistent gap remains between religious teachings and actual behavioral practices.

The complexity of maintaining social harmony is rooted in the fundamental challenge of understanding and respecting diverse cultural and religious practices. While all religions fundamentally advocate for good values and mutual respect, there exists a significant disconnect between religious teachings and daily life interactions. This discrepancy poses a potential threat to the unity and social wellbeing of Malaysian society.

Recognizing these challenges, Dato' Dr Mahmood Merican has agreed to provide a seed fund of MYR75,000.00 to the Universiti Malaya Centre for Civilisational Dialogue (UMCCD) for the enculturation of universal values in daily life activities among young people from diverse religious backgrounds.

The series program is uniquely positioned to address the critical need for deeper interreligious understanding. It explores the extent to which individuals are open to understanding different cultural and religious practices, and how this understanding can be fostered. By targeting students, parents, and lecturers from public universities across Malaysia, this interdisciplinary study provides insights that can bridge the gap between religious teachings and actual social interactions, ultimately contributing to the broader goal of national unity and social wellbeing.



ABSTRACT:

Dalam era moden yang penuh cabaran, dialog antara agama sering dilihat sebagai solusi untuk menangani konflik perhubungan antara agama. Namun, pelaksanaannya sering dikritik, khususnya dalam konteks Islam, kerana dianggap bercanggah dengan prinsip akidah Ahl al-Sunnah wa al-Jama'ah. Di Malaysia, permasalahan ini merupakan isu serius yang mempengaruhi pemikiran masyarakat secara halus dan berpotensi merosakkan asas akidah yang sebenar. Walaupun dialog antara agama terus digunakan sebagai alat untuk memupuk keharmonian, masih kurang kajian yang mendalam mengenai permasalahan yang timbul serta masih tiada garis jelas terhadap pelaksanaannya. yang menggunakan pendekatan kualitatif dengan tumpuan kepada analisis kepustakaan dan Perbincangan Meja Bulat (Round Table Dsicussion) untuk mencapai tiga objektif utama: menjelaskan perkembangan dialog antara agama di Malaysia, mengenalpasti isu dan cabaran dalam pengamalannya, serta membentuk garis panduan baharu bagi pelaksanaan dialog ini. Hasil kajian ini diharapkan dapat memberi panduan praktikal tanpa menggadaikan prinsip akidah Ahli Sunnah wa al-Jama'ah.

corruption. The event, titled "Intercultural-Religious Dialogue on Integrity and Corruption" (Dialog Antara Pelbagai Budaya-Agama Mengenai Integriti dan Rasuah), drew an impressive audience of approximately 250 participants.

Held at the High Impact Research Building's Auditorium, the program was accessible both physically and virtually, reflecting a commitment to broad engagement and accessibility. The dialogue served a critical purpose: to illuminate the devastating impacts of corruption and foster a deeper understanding of integrity within Malaysia's diverse societal landscape.

Dr. Iyad Abu Moghli's address highlighted the critical intersection of environmental stewardship and Islamic teachings. He introduced the "Islamic Declaration on Climate Change," a powerful call to action that demands:

- Preserving nature's delicate equilibrium
- Recognizing the moral obligation of environmental conservation

(April 28, 2023) The Regional Network for Peacebuilders Project brought together a diverse group of 30 participants at Rimba Ilmu, Universiti Malaya, in a groundbreaking dialogue aimed at exploring pathways to


peaceful and harmonious societies. The collaborative initiative, jointly organized by the International Network of Engaged Buddhists (INEB) and UMCCD, focused on grassroots engagement and meaningful cross-sector communication.

The innovative dialogue format featured five parallel sessions, each exploring critical contemporary themes:

- Digital Technology
- · Economy and Politics
- Education
- Gender
- Climate

Participants represented a rich tapestry of backgrounds, including university students, UMCCD members, professionals from Family Health International (FHI360), representatives from the US Agency for International Development (USAID), and Malaysian experts in technology and human rights. This diverse assembly highlighted the event's commitment to inclusive dialogue and collaborative problem-solving.

By creating spaces for open, nuanced conversations across different sectors and perspectives, the dialogue aimed to uncover shared challenges and potential collaborative solutions in building more peaceful, understanding communities.



Communication Through Imagery: Exploring a Visual Language for Humanity

(March 7, 2023) UMCCD and International Institute of Advanced Islamic Studies (IAIS) Malaysia co-organized a thought-provoking lecture that delved into the intricate relationship between visual perception, understanding, and human communication.

"Communication through Imagery: Exploring a Visual Language for Humanity" featured Dr. Eric Winkel, renowned translator of al-Futūḥāt al-Makkīyah, with Dr. Asmawati Muhammad moderating the session.

Drawing from Ibn Arabi's philosophical insights, Dr. Winkel explored the profound difference between seeing and understanding. He emphasized that while eyes always capture data accurately, the mind often limits and distorts perception. Optical illusions were presented as a prime example of how mental interpretation can restrict the raw visual experience.

The lecture introduced the concept of cognitive dissonance as a critical moment of insight—a point where mental confusion creates space for deeper heart-centered understanding. Dr. Winkel challenged participants to move beyond immediate mental categorizations, advocating for a more holistic approach to perceiving human relationships and experiences.

Expanding on Ibn Arabi's metaphor of Mother Earth, the discussion touched on humanity's disconnect from natural wisdom. Just as a baby learns from its mother, humans should learn from the earth—a lesson increasingly critical in addressing climate change and social challenges.

The engaging presentation sparked numerous questions during the Q&A session, highlighting the audience's deep interest in alternative ways of perception and communication.



Art of Dialogue: Intersecting Anthropology and Religion

(March 1, 2023) IAIS Malaysia hosted a compelling forum exploring the dynamics of meaningful communication. "The Art of Dialogue: Intersecting Anthropology and Religion" brought together Dr. Lee-Shan Tse

(Art Director of the al-Futūḥāt project), and Prof. Dato' Dr. Christopher Boey Chiong Meng (Chairman of the Malaysian Sokka Kindergarten Board of Governors and Research Fellow at the Institute of Oriental Philosophy in Japan), with Mr. Muhammad Sayuti Mansor moderating.

Dr. Lee-Shan Tse approached dialogue from an anthropological perspective, emphasizing the importance of avoiding external labeling and practicing mindful listening. She highlighted the need to respect individual perspectives and allow conversations to unfold naturally, without judgment.

Prof. Boey expanded on the philosophical dimensions of dialogue, presenting it as far more than a mere exchange of information. He defined dialogue as a profound attempt to connect deeply and understand one another. The ultimate purpose, he explained, extends beyond personal interaction to contribute to individual growth and societal betterment.

The forum outlined key criteria for meaningful dialogue:

- Mutual respect
- Viewing all participants as equal partners
- Honoring diversity of perspectives
- Seeking common ground
- Maintaining an open heart
- Practicing patient and deep listening

The forum underscored dialogue's potential to foster personal growth and contribute to societal understanding, transforming communication from a transactional interaction to a transformative experience.



Pre-Intellect Human Communication: Speaking from the Heart and From the Imaginal

approach to understanding and connection.

(February 22, 2023) UMCCD and IAIS Malaysia co-organized a thought-provoking public lecture that delved into the deeper dimensions of human communication. The event brought together scholars and enthusiasts to explore a transformative

Dr. Eric Winkel, an acclaimed Islamic scholar renowned for his 23-year dedication to translating Ibn Arabi's seminal work al-Futūḥāt al-Makkīyah, served as the keynote speaker. Moderated by Mr. Muhammad Sayuti Mansor, a Research Fellow at IAIS, the lecture was broadcast live both in-person at the IAIS Malaysia Board Room and via the IAIS Facebook platform.

Drawing inspiration from the profound philosophical insights of Ibn Arabi, a 12th-century Arab Andalusian mystic and philosopher, Dr. Winkel explored communication that transcends intellectual boundaries. The lecture challenged traditional notions of dialogue by emphasizing the power of heart-centered and imaginative communication.

At the core of the discussion was a critical examination of conventional communication methods. Dr. Winkel argued that most communication challenges arise from an intellectual approach that tends to be restrictive, divisive, and reductive. The typical intellectual discourse often operates on a zero-sum paradigm, viewing interactions through a binary lens of 'for' or 'against'. In contrast, the lecture proposed an alternative model of communication rooted in mutual respect, openness, and deep emotional connection. Referencing the Arabic concept of shura - metaphorically described as "gathering honey" - Dr. Winkel emphasized the potential for authentic dialogue that emerges when we move beyond intellectual constraints.

The philosophical framework drew heavily from Ibn Arabi's mystical teachings, exploring the concept of communication that originates from the heart and imagination. This approach invites participants to access a more profound level of understanding, one that transcends logical reasoning and taps into a more holistic form of human connection.



Governing Diversity, Multicultural Societies, and Faith: A Conversation

(February 8, 2023) UMCCD hosted a transformative dialogue that brought together thought leaders and community members to explore the delicate art of maintaining harmony in a multicultural

society. The event featured Dr. Hisham A. Hellyer, a distinguished scholar from the University of Cambridge and a nonresident scholar at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, who shared profound insights into building bridges across cultural and religious divides.

The session began with welcoming remarks from Tuan Azril Mohd Amin, Chief Executive Officer of Institut Masa Depan Malaysia (MASA), setting a tone of openness and mutual respect. Prof. Datuk Dr. Azizan Baharuddin, Director of UMCCD, introduced Dr. Hellyer and moderated the engaging discussion that followed.

At the heart of Dr. Hellyer's message was a powerful vision of social cohesion. He emphasized the critical role of religious leaders in public discourse, advocating for religious institutions to be viewed as open, secure spaces where people can connect and communicate freely. "In a multiracial and multi-faith society," Dr. Hellyer noted, "understanding the basic values of our fellow citizens is not just important—it's essential."

The dialogue explored innovative approaches to interfaith communication, presenting dialogue as a powerful tool for building mutual understanding. Participants were encouraged to look beyond surface-level differences and recognize the shared human values that unite diverse communities. The interactive session sparked meaningful conversations about how individuals can contribute to a more inclusive and empathetic society.

Enthusiasm was palpable throughout the event, with participants actively engaging with the speaker's insights and sharing their own perspectives. The session concluded with a symbolic photography session, capturing the spirit of unity and collective commitment to peaceful coexistence.

The forum featured three distinguished panelists: Mr. Azril Mohd Amin, CEO of MASA; Mr. Faisal Abdul Aziz, President of Angkatan Belia Islam Malaysia; and Mr. Ravichandran A/L Balasubramaniam, Chairman of Teluk Kemang Hindu Youth Organization. Moderated by Assoc. (August 17-18, 2022) UMCCD hosted the International Conference on Civilisational Dialogue 2022 (ICONCIDI '22), bringing together global perspectives on critical challenges facing humanity.

Conducted virtually via Zoom, the conference explored the theme "The Future of Civilisation: Reimagining Sustainability" through six comprehensive sessions addressing pivotal global issues:

- Future of Civilisations & Dialogue of Civilisations
- Circular Economy & Climate Justice
- · Science, Religion & Worldviews
- Sustainable Development & Local Actions
- Social Justice & Widening Gaps between the Rich and Poor
- · The Meaning of Being Human in the Era of Al

The conference aimed to foster meaningful dialogue, encourage innovative thinking, and explore interconnected challenges facing global societies in the 21st century.





Role of Youths in Civilisation and Sustainability

(May 30, 2022) In an era of complex global challenges, the role of youth in shaping our collective future has never been more critical. A recent collaborative forum between Institut Kajian Dasar (IKD) and MASA

illuminated the pivotal path young leaders must navigate to drive meaningful change. On this date, visionary leaders gathered to explore "The Role of Youths in Civilisation & Sustainability," offering a compelling blueprint for national progress. Mr. Azril Mohd Amin, CEO of MASA, set the tone with an inspiring special lecture, emphasizing the importance of a holistic national approach to sustainable development.

The forum, moderated by Assoc. Prof. Dr. Wendy Yee Mei Tien, brought together an exceptional panel of youth leaders who represent the dynamism and potential of Malaysia's next generation. 
Cabaran Mantik Kepada Muslim

Religion and Post-Modernism

(March 1, 2022) UMCCD inaugurated its lecture series with a thought-provoking presentation by Prof. Dr. Mohd Hazim Shah Abdul Murad from Universiti Utara Malaysia (UUM). The lecture, titled "Religion and

Post-Modernism," offered a profound exploration of cultural and intellectual dynamics in contemporary global contexts.

Moderated by the UMCCD Director, the session delved into the complex relationship between Western modernistic approaches and alternative cultural perspectives. Prof. Hazim presented a nuanced critique of contemporary societal structures, challenging the tendency of Muslim societies to uncritically adopt Western systemic models.

The lecture's key insight emphasized the importance of intellectual and cultural autonomy. Prof. Hazim argued that while Western societies predominantly approach politics, administration, economics, and technology through a modernistic lens, Muslim societies must develop their own intellectual frameworks. These frameworks should be deeply rooted in their religious traditions and value systems, rather than simply mimicking external models.

This inaugural lecture set a powerful tone for the UMCCD's commitment to fostering critical dialogue and deep cultural understanding. Faith in the times of pandemic: Coping mechanisms for the vulnerable in Asia



This webinar was in conjunction with the World Suicide Prevention Day and the upcoming World Mental Health Day. The speakers which were from Indonesia, Malaysia and Thailand, acknowledged that anxiety and stress are normal when people are faced with uncertainties. The pandemic has caused intense stress and disruption to people, and is causing pronounced mental health concerns in various vulnerable groups of the population. The speakers discussed on various coping mechanisms and mentioned that religious and spiritual coping strategies were essential means that can be used to deal with the consequences of COVID19.



Dialogue Series Malaysia Day Edition: Our Hope for Malaysia

(September 23, 2021) UMCCD in collaboration with Projek 57, held a dialogue entitled "Malaysia Harapan Kita" in conjunction with Malaysia Day. Tuan Haji Badlishah Sham, Krishna Kumar, and Nelson Jia Jun Ng were the panelists, while Assoc. Prof. Dr. Durriyyah Sharifah Hasan Adli was the moderator. In order to accomplish the goals of this forum, each panelist came from different backgrounds. Malaysia's future must be shaped from numerous perspectives going forward, based on the recommendations of people in power. MCO has let us witness a substantial loss of human lives, physical and

mental health problems, economy distress, and social disruption. This forum discussed on the researches and recommendations in building a better and prosperous future for Malaysia, and the importance of unity among Malaysians to achieve it. The program aimed to explore the perspectives of Malays, Chinese, and Indians on the formation of a stable and strong Malaysian future, learning how to create a harmonious Malaysia, and discussed on steps to be taken to address the economy, education, and family crises, so that Malaysia can set a good example to the world.



Dialogue Series Independence Day Edition: Independence during the Pandemic

(August 25, 2021) UMCCD held this forum via Google meet, Facebook live, and Youtube live. Dr. Alwani Ghazali was the moderator while the panelists were Prof. Datuk Dr. Harlina Hj. Siraj from Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia (UKM), Assoc. Prof. Dr. Yee Mei Tien from Universiti Malaya (UM), and Kiridaren Jayakumar from Open University Malaysia (OUM). On the eve of independence this year, the number of COVID-19 positive cases increased to over 1 million despite the implementation of Movement Control Order (MCO) for

several months. The people's anger began to peak as more people lost their source of income, leading them to become mentally stressed. Children involved with online learning process started to feel bored and lose focus. At the tertiary institution level, graduates felt burdened with the new mode of learning. That was the scenario people were facing. According to the panelists, in this pandemic era, independence not only meant recognising the country's freedom, but also freedom in terms of the people's mental health and economy. This forum met its objectives which included learning about the perspectives of Malays, Chinese, and Indians on the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, determining how mental well-being can be strengthened during the pandemic, and discussing measures that can be taken in the face of economic, educational, and family crises during the pandemic.

(July 10, 2021) The dialogue series was conducted by Dr. Alwani Ghazali, Deputy Director of UMCCD. It aimed to answer all questions about dialogue. Simply described, dialogue is a "two-way discussion between two persons with opposing viewpoints on a subject, with the goal of learning the other person's perspective on the subject or issue being addressed" (Leonard Swidler). Dialogue has two interactive dimensions: individual consideration and the sharing of ideas with others. The first dimension enables a person to get to know himself by requiring him

to spend time reflecting or self-reflecting. Contact with

others is possible in the second dimension. Following that, there are seven different types of human verbal exchange: Conversation, discussion, meeting, debate, storytelling, face-to-face contact between two people, and a group of people who have come together to investigate or make a conclusion on a topic.

The Role of Religion in **Maintaining Mental Wellness** during the Covid-19 Pandemic

(March 9, 2021) UMCCD and Department of Agidah & Islamic Thought, Universiti Malaya jointly organized this webinar. The panelists were from different religions; Prof. Dr. Che Zarrina represented Islam, Dr. Balakrishnan Kandasamy represented Hindu, Mr. Thai Ming Yeow represented Buddhism, Father Xavier **Andrew** represented Christianity, and Dr. Charanjit represented Sikhism. The moderator was Assoc. Prof. Dr. Durriyyah Sharifah Hasan Adli. This interfaith talk aimed to convey perspectives from the different religions

on mental health, to understand how believers of the different religions help the mentally sick, and to explore initiatives in helping and supporting mental patients that seek clinical therapy during this highly crucial time. A group of experts from the Department of Medical Psychology Universiti Malaya reported in an article entitled "Impacts of COVID-19 Pandemic on Mental Health in Malaysia: A Single Thread of Hope" that stress and mental illness such as depression and anxiety disorders were on the rise. As a first step by the government to reduce the number of mental healthrelated patients, advertisements urging people to live a healthy and balanced lifestyle were broadcast in the media. The significance of religion in mental healthcare was emphasised. All panelists agreed that the pandemic significantly impacted the community's psyche. The program positively impacted and provided assistance to all participants.

Scriptural Reasoning on Religious Pluralism: A Dialogue

(February 23, 2021) UMCCD held a dialogue via Google Meet, which was also covered via Facebook live. The panelists for the dialogue were Dr. Alwani Ghazali, Deputy Director of UMCCD and Father Eugene Benedict from St. Theresa Church Nilai. The speakers discussed about the stands and views from their respective religion on religious pluralism. Both parties tried to understand each others' point of views through their comprehension of the Quran and the Bible. Dr. Alwani Ghazali mentioned the writing of John Hicks regarding pluralism: "Pluralism is the view that the great world faiths embody different

perceptions and conceptions of, and correspondingly different responses to, the Real or the Ultimate from within the major variant cultural ways of being a human; and that within each of them the transformation of human existence, from self-centeredness to Reality centeredness is manifestly taking place..., so far as human observation can tell".



Dialogue Series: Life Challenges during MCO from Various Perspectives of Life

(February 15, 2021) UMCCD organised the first webinar of the dialogue series. To kickstart the series, "Cabaran Hidup sewaktu PKP Daripada Pelbagai Perspektif Kehidupan" was held via Google Meet. Society is confronted with many issues and challenges during the pandemic. Dr. Rosilawati elaborated on the purpose of Movement Control Order (MCO), parties involved in the MCO, the impacts of it, and future plans after the MCO. She talked on the challenges faced by people from various perspectives of life and suggested ways to

reduce the impact of these challenges. She reminded that each stratum of the society has to play their role in maintaining life's well-being, especially during this pandemic. This responsibility involves not only personal safety, but also the well-being of the society as a whole. The webinar received positive feedback and met its objectives in instilling awareness in the general public about the repercussions of the pandemic and the actions that must be taken to encounter it.
